Current reason for review:

Desire to move beyond information acquisition toward Scriptural Literacy, Berean Readiness, Spiritual Readiness, and Behavioral Readiness. Current focus is evaluating how assumptions, inherited frameworks, confirmation bias, and interpretation patterns influence understanding and application of Scripture.

Patterns that appear consistent throughout the learning process:

- Desire for familiar passages that reinforce existing beliefs.
- Tendency to search for confirmation before observation.
- Emotional attachment to previously accepted interpretations.
- Difficulty separating tradition from text.
- Increased understanding when slowing down and remaining in observation mode.
- Greater clarity when cross-referencing Scripture.
- Improved interpretation when assumptions are identified before conclusions are formed.
- Stronger retention when truth is integrated into behavior rather than merely discussed.

Cross-Referencing	Where else does Scripture discuss this?	Allow Scripture to interpret Scripture.
Integration	What is changing in me?	Move from knowledge to transformation.
Behavioral Readiness	Can I live what I am learning?	Produce observable fruit.
